# PART III: Regional Updates SECTION 4: North Desert Region

### OVERVIEW

As stated in the Introduction to this report, the focus and primary goal of this service review is to provide the Commission with recommendations to: (1) update the determinations from previous service reviews, (2) initiate sphere of influence updates where appropriate, and (3) continue monitoring where appropriate. In order to fulfill the service review requirements of Government Code §56430, a review of the items, listed below, is included in this section as they pertain to the North Desert Region.

# A. AGENCY BOUNDARIES


The North Desert Region, with approximately 10,779 square miles, is the largest region geographically in the County and the second largest in terms of population. The Mojave Basin lies in the High Desert and is located on the northeastern flanks of the San Bernardino and San Gabriel Mountains that separate the High Desert from the coastal basins and inland valleys of the greater Los Angeles and Orange County areas. Overall, land surface elevations within the Mojave Region range from 5,500 feet above sea level in the San Bernardino Mountains on the south to 1,500 feet near Afton Canyon on the east.


Within the North Desert, nine agencies under LAFCO purview as well as the Marine Corps Logistics Base Barstow provide fire and emergency services. A map showing agency boundaries is included in Figure 3-24.


# **B. AGENCY SPHERES OF INFLUENCE**


"Sphere of influence" means a plan for the probably physical boundaries and service area of a local agency, as determined by the Commission (§56076). Spheres both proactively guide and respond to the need for the extension of infrastructure and delivery of municipal services to areas of emerging growth and development. The requirement for LAFCOs to conduct service reviews was established to acknowledge the importance of spheres, and recognize that periodic updates of spheres should be conducted with the benefit of current information available through service reviews.


Figure 3-25 shows the spheres of influence for each of the nine agencies under LAFCO purview that provide fire protection and emergency services in the North Desert Region.





# C. RESPONSIBILITY AREAS

Responsibilities for fire suppression are generally divided between local, state and federal agencies. Areas not within a state or federal responsibility area are a local responsibility. These local agencies primarily include the county, cities and special districts. State and Federal agencies address fire prevention and suppression on state and federal lands.

The North Desert Region is dominated by a variety of federal lands, including, but not limited to, the Fort Irwin Military Reservation, Mojave National Preserve, Death Valley National Park and China Lake Naval Air Weapons Station. As shown on Table 3-12, below, federal agencies are responsible for fire suppression for the vast majority of land (79 percent) within the North Desert Region, but local agencies are responsible for serving the most people (86 percent).






For addressing wildland fires, CAL FIRE, U.S. Forest Service, and U.S. Bureau of Land Management coordinate with local agencies. Military institutions and some Indian tribes have their own fire departments. LAFCO does not have purview over these agencies. Should a structure fire occur in a state or federal responsibility area that is within the overlying local agency, then the suppression is the primary responsibility of the local agency.

# D. AMBULANCE OPERATING AREAS

Agencies that provide structural fire protection also provide emergency medical services as an integral part of their response efforts. Emergency medical services generally refer to life support services and ambulance transport. There are 12 ambulance operating areas designated by the Inland Counties Emergency Medical Authority ("ICEMA") in the North Desert Region (more fully described in Part 1, Section 1 of this report).

County Fire, with six operating areas and a service area of approximately 5,685 square miles (53 percent of the North Desert Region), covers the communities of Baker, Crest Forest, Lucerne Valley and Phelan-Piñon Hills and serves a population of approximately 135,000. AMR serves the largest population in the North Desert, generally covering the communities of Adelanto, Apple Valley, Spring Valley Lake, and Victorville, which encompass a population of approximately 278,406 and 987.9 square miles (9% of the region).



# E. STATION LOCATIONS AND STATION DRIVE TIMES


## Station Locations

The location of the fire station plays an important role in delivering efficient emergency service. Ten fire and emergency services agencies provide fire protection and emergency medical service from 30 active fire stations located throughout the North Desert Region. County Fire, with ten active stations, is currently the largest fire service provider in the North Desert Region covering the communities of Adelanto, Baker, Helendale, Hesperia, Lucerne Valley, Phelan Pinon Hills, Spring Valley Lake, and Wrightwood. Figure 3-28 shows all the fire protection agency areas and the locations of their fire stations.


#### Station Drive Times


The distance between a fire station and the location of an emergency has a significant impact of response time. LAFCO staff conducted a drive time analysis to evaluate the emergency service coverage in the North Desert Region.


Figures 3-29 and 3-30 show the areas that can be reached from all fire stations within the North Desert Region in five and ten minutes, respectively. Staff performed the analysis using typical traffic conditions during mid-week (Wednesday at 12:00 P.M.) driving a standard fire rescue vehicle. The populated portions of the North Desert are concentrated in a relatively small portion of the Region. Using population distribution data available through ESRI Community Analyst, staff determined that 56.6 percent of the North Desert's populated areas are covered within a five-minute drive time area, and 88.1 percent of the populated areas of the desert contain large lots and undeveloped pockets.





